The **Way** of the **Cross**

Jesus stumbles under the weight of the cross on the Via Dolorosa way to Calvary. Simon of Cyrene, a convenient passer-by, is compelled to take over the burden. This is not something he expected, coming in from the countryside.

Probably he would have preferred not to be involved at all for it is hard for any of us to carry another's cross. Far easier to be silent, keep our distance and just be a passer-by. Simon really had no choice, but we do. Let us think whose burden we can help to lighten.

Crowds follow Jesus on the way to Calvary. Some women weep in their pity for his suffering. Yet even in this darkest hour, Jesus shows his selfless compassion, turning to them with words

"Daughters of Jerusalem, do not weep for me, but for yourselves and for your children" (Luke 23:28).

His words echo down the centuries to us today, crying out for compassion as women and children across the world continue to be marginalised.

Jesus invites us to respond, but his words are also a warning for the future. He is imploring us to turn from wrongdoing and follow him. Nearing the place of crucifixion, a woman slips forward and taking off her outer veil, wipes away the sweat and blood from Jesus' face. When the veil is returned it bears an imprint of his face.

Today, Christ's face is in those who are homeless and helpless, starving and suffering. Veronica is a legendary figure, but her simple gesture urges us to do whatever small act we can for those in need. In doing so, we are brought closer to having the imprint of Jesus in our hearts.

Did Mary and the other Marys present feel at the moment of his cruel death that the flame of faith was being extinguished forever? Then the dawn broke on the third day and nothing would ever be the same again. For them and for us, the cross and the resurrection are the centre of Christian life.

Whenever we feel our faith is being put to the test, let us remember the women at the foot of the cross, the joy of Easter Sunday and the self-sharing, unconditional love of Jesus for us all.

Bardsey & East Keswick **Running Club**

2023 was a truly eventful year for the club. The world was back to normality. The London Marathon was back in April (greeted by torrential rain) and the inaugural Rob Burrow Leeds Marathon set off on a sunny Sunday in May, both of which had representation from the Club.

Triathlons were completed, 24hr races run and '5k parkruns' became a staple diet, but in all this running the club members were also determined to raise money for good causes and charities close to their hearts.

We believe running is great for mental wellbeing, so what better way to support this philosophy than raising £934 for **Mind**.

£1,098 was raised for **Martin House**, a local charity, which has helped some members of Bardsey Sports Club through tough times, to support the good work they do.

£274 went to MacMillan Cancer Support.

Embrace, a charity supporting the Paediatric Intensive Care Unit in Leeds received £990.

Miscarriage, stillbirth and premature birth effect too many lives and too many of our friends and families £1,060 was raised for **Tommy's** to fund vital research to stop this happening.

The **Yorkshire Brain Appeal** were thankful for the £3,620 raised to fund research into brain disease, with particular focus on epilepsy, multiple sclerosis, Parkinson's, dementia and Alzheimer's.

One club member had the indignity of walking around as a 1970s 'throw back' while raising £860 for **Movember**.

All in all we raised £8,836 for good causes.

Waxwing Winter

One of the most beautiful birds to be seen in the UK is the waxwing. It has a magnificent crest, a black eyeliner and bright flashes of yellow. They get their name from the bright red tips to some of their wing feathers, which look like drops of sealing wax.

They are winter visitors, travelling here from Scandinavia when the food supply there runs low. Some winters there are only small numbers but in other years they arrive in their thousands - an event known as an irruption, and this year we have an irruption! In some places in Scotland there have been over 500 and recently there were over 200 near the canal in Skipton.

The first waxwings of the winter are often seen in October, usually in the north of the UK and along the east coast. They are partial to the colourful red and orange berries of ornamental trees, which can often be found in city centres, supermarket car parks and out-of-town shopping areas. Not your typical birdwatching destinations!

I recently saw them at the Lidl supermarket car park in Thirsk and there was a flock of 20 in Crossgates (where these pictures were taken) on New Year's Day. There have also been sightings in Wetherby and I saw a flock, which is known as a 'museum', in a previous winter, on a Rowan tree near the entrance to Bardsey cricket field.

Highways Update

A58 - Proposed Traffic Island: We have contacted LCC and are awaiting a reply on when this proposed traffic island, on the A58 near to Mill Lane, might be implemented.

A58: BPC have noted several unstable trees in the areas from Cornmill Ginnel to beyond Church Lane and towards Hetchell View. This has been reported to LCC.

A58 - Bank Top: 'Wetherby' road sign, lying by the side of the path, at the top of Keswick Lane was reported and has now been reinstated.

A58 – Grange Close: A demolished street sign has still not been reinstated and has again been reported to LCC.

Woodacre Lane: We have reported blocked drains to LCC Gullies and have been informed that arrangements are in place for them to be cleared.

ELEPHONE

Red Telephone Box Library on Church Lane

This is owned by the Parish Council with the library and books managed by the WI. It was agreed that the telephone box needs refurbishing and repainting and quotations will be sought.

Hedgehog Highway Project

We have been approached about hedgehog conservation and are considering purchasing a box of 'hedgehog highway surrounds' and making them available to residents. A hedgehog highway is a 5 inch gap in a fence and is essential in the battle to prevent their extinction. Hedgehog shaped fence surrounds raise awareness to the plight of hedgehogs and are made from recycled plastic. For more information, please see; www.hedgehogsrus.co.uk/hedgehoghighway-project

Eco Chat: **Green Energy**

This is a tricky one...

Green energy refers to energy produced from renewable sources, such as solar and wind, preferably without creating any carbon emissions at all.

The energy we use at home for heating, cooking and powering all those electrical goods, comes mainly from burning fossil fuels like coal, oil and natural gas (methane), which were laid down millions of years ago. They are the biggest source of carbon emissions and are clearly not renewable, at least not in the next million years or so.

Unless you produce your own electricity, less than 40% of your supply currently comes from renewable sources - even if you are on a 100% green tariff! The problem is our grid system cant' distinguish between the different generation sources - they all get combined. Natural gas is still the main fuel source used for generating electricity but the good news is that wind power is now the second highest contributor. Nuclear power accounts for around 10%, but whilst producing no carbon emissions it is not a renewable source and has other environmental concerns.

Natural gas is widely used for heating our homes and whilst it is possible to produce renewable gas and oil supplies from waste organic materials and vegetable matter (known as biofuels), the quantities available are very small. Some suppliers are offering 100% green tariffs, but the same problem exists as with electricity, the grid can't distinguish between sources, which means you are unlikely to receiving more than 2% from renewable sources. They also still create carbon emissions when burnt!

Biomass (solid organic material, primarily wood) is another fuel that falls into a similar category. Whether burnt in a boiler or the ubiquitous 'log burner', it creates carbon emissions and its renewable status relies on enough new trees/crops being grown to replace the quantity burnt.

Longer term new fuels like hydrogen may become available but today electricity, although not quite there yet, is the closest we can get to 100% renewable energy, without creating carbon emissions. When used in conjunction with heat pumps it can also provide a near zero emissions solution for heating. That said heat pumps are not ideal for all homes and currently electricity pieces are much higher than gas or oil.

So, what is the green energy solution?

That depends on individual circumstances, but undoubtedly it relies on us using less energy than we do today and is likely to involve a hybrid of fuels to suit those individual circumstances. Perhaps combining electricity with biofuel options or smaller volumes of natural gas. Generating your own electricity is worth considering but won't be suitable for all. Tricky indeed!

In our church buildings we now use low energy LED lighting with a 100% green tariff, and we are exploring alternatives to our gas heating system, which would allow us to heat people more effectively.

The energy we use for travel is another story!

THE VALUE OF HAZEL TO WOODLANDS AND WILDLIFE

On **Sunday 17 March** we are holding a Spring Family Day at the Ellikers and one of the activities will be planting hazel. Hazel (Corylus avellana) is a native broadleaved tree, which when left to grow can reach around 12 metres in height and can live for around 80 years. It is however more often coppiced and can then live for several hundred years.

Male and female flowers are found on the same tree. The yellow male catkins appear before the leaves around mid-February and are one of the first signs of spring. They are often known as lamb's tails. The female flowers are tiny and bud-like. They are pollinated by the wind and the female flowers then develop into oval fruits which then mature into a nut.



Coppicing is an ancient tradition which dates back to the Stone Age. New growth is cut back at intervals to encourage new stems to



sprout. The pliable stems were used to make wattle baskets, furniture and water divining sticks. The nuts or cobs were an important food source.

Today, managed woodland where hazel is coppiced, provides a rich wildlife habitat. Shelter is provided for ground nesting birds such as willow warbler, wren and blackcap. Hazel leaves are an important food source for the caterpillars of several species of moth. The flowers are an early source of pollen for bees and butterflies. Hazelnuts are eaten and cached by nuthatches, tits, jays, woodpeckers, squirrels and small mammals.

The cut stems are still used for crafts, as bean poles or to top laid hedges and of course we also eat hazelnuts. Examples of coppicing can be seen in our ancient woodland at Ox Close.
